Our Mission Statement

THE AGRA BEAR RESCUE FACILITY

The Agra Bear Rescue facility was established in 1999 by Wildlife SOS in collaboration with the Uttar Pradesh Forest Department and currently houses nearly 200 rescued sloth bears.



At the Agra Bear Rescue Facility, every single bear undergoes a 90-day quarantine period upon arrival at the center. The Quarantine is carried out in two specially designed quarantine building units (marked 15 and 22) on the CZA Approved Master Layout Plans respectively.

Rescued bears are quite often susceptible to diseases like rabies, leptospirosis and infectious canine hepatitis. For the above, the bears receive vaccination at the Agra Bear Rescue Facility under the care of our eminent veterinarians.

Every bear receives a complete health checkup and is provided veterinary care and medical treatment for wounds, disease and parasites.



During this 90 day quarantine period, every single bear is subjected to extensive observation by our veterinarians, Para-veterinarians and animal keepers for any behavior aberrations while also watching for signs of stress or stereotypic behavior like pacing, head bobbing etc. Symptoms which indicate the trauma the bear may have suffered prior to arrival at the Agra Bear Rescue Facility are analyzed by the veterinarians to calibrate the treatment as well as planning the bear's future housing with other compatible individuals. Both during and after the quarantine period, a high degree of veterinary care is provided to every animal at ABRF.


The sloth bears are confiscated by Forest Department and enforcement agencies under sections of Wildlife Protection Act 1972 and handed over for long term medical treatment and lifetime care to Wildlife SOS Agra Bear Rescue Facility. This was to eradicate the illegal practice of Bear Dancing which was causing poaching of bear cubs from the forests across India and killing of female bears thus impacting the wild sloth bear population.

The Agra Bear Rescue Facility thus plays a very critical role in the conservation and protection of sloth bears in the wild.






History of Dancing Bears: The bears were used by nomadic kalandar community for street entertainment after capturing them from the wild by subjecting them to brutal methods of training including breaking of teeth and claws and inserting a rope through their delicate muzzle. This systematic trauma and exploitation of these wild bears rendering the animals unfit for release in the wild due to extensive and systematic malnourishment that results in various physical and psychological disabilities. Since these bears are unfit to be released in the wild following rescue, it is imperative to rehabilitate them so that they can receive lifetime care and treatment.



Following the successful completion of the 90 day quarantine period, the bears are shifted to large forested socialization enclosures where they have access to large free ranging areas with extensive enrichment opportunities such as ponds, climbing structures, termite

mounds, fallen logs, leaf litters, and wood piles etc which help them engage in natural bear behavior as in the wild.



Every bear is also provided extensive enclosure enrichment to combat boredom and stereotypical behavior. Based on each bear's personality, he/she is matched to other individuals. The socialization enclosures allow sloth bears to be housed together in compatible groups thus enabling them to interact with each other.

The Agra Bear Rescue facility has several full time well wildlife veterinarians and a dedicated team of bear keepers to care for rescued bears. Two laboratories for blood diagnostics and microbiology monitoring have been established in the Agra Bear Rescue Facility.

The objective of Agra Bear Rescue Facility is to provide long term medical treatment and rehabilitation as well as lifetime care for sloth bears that have been rescued from situations that make them unfit for release in the wild.



The ABRF hospital is equipped with Digital X-Ray, Ultrasound, Dental Suite, Endoscope, Blood Analyzer and dedicated Operation Theatre.



A specialized bear cub weaning and foster care center is also established inside the ABRF for critical natal care of orphan bear cubs, who are susceptible to diseases and mortality and require extensive care, particularly during the early months.

Bear keepers are trained for natal care.

The Agra Bear Rescue Facility is run by Wildlife SOS with the cooperation of the Uttar Pradesh Forest Department under guidance of the Central Zoo Authority with the support of Wildlife SOS donors, volunteers and supporters.
